Domestic violence in Oregon is on the rise. So far, domestic violence has killed nine Oregonians this year. Last year, 22 people were killed. Domestic violence is not limited by age, gender, income, education levels, or geography. This seminar provides information and resources from a civil perspective to help victims of domestic violence. A panel of experts discusses how culture and society affect domestic violence victims and your representation of them.
